

Greg Zerzan

Greg Zerzan has worked in several prominent positions in the U.S. government and private sector, starting with his service as counsel and general counsel to the U.S. House Committee on Agriculture. He later became senior counsel to the House Committee on Banking, and the House Committee on Financial Services. In these positions he was instrumental in helping create legislation such as the Commodity Futures Modernization Act, the Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act, and the Sarbanes-Oxley Act. In 2003 Zerzan was named Deputy Assistant Secretary for Financial Institutions in the US Treasury. In that position, and later as Acting Assistant Secretary, he helped guide government policy including in the areas of GSE reform, terrorism risk insurance, and oversight of the financial services sector. Currently Zerzan is counsel for the International Swaps and Derivatives Association. Zerzan frequently testifies before Congress and appears on television and in print discussing matters related to markets and U.S. government policy.
